Sub: Effective implementation of Convergence Programme for forest right holders under FRA, 2006-OTELP areas for the year 2016-17.

Madam/Sir,

In inviting a reference to the above cited subject, I am to say that the OTELP has facilitated community as a whole to avail Community Forest Right (CFR) under FRA, 2006. The programme aims for ensure the livelihoods and food security to the tribals.

The Government has stressed on implementation of convergence programme to ensure transformation of the Forest Right into gainful livelihood. The guideline for implementation of the decision taken in the 8th SLMC is enclosed herewith for reference. Some of the important strategy for convergence are indicated below:

- Awareness of Convergence Programme and schemes meant for Forest Right Holder under FRA.
- Gram Sabha based planning of convergence programme with the involvement of forest right holders, CFR, Management Committee Members and Women.
- Support mechanism at the district and sub-divisional level to support Gram Sabha in planning and effective implementation of the convergence programme.
- Coordination between the line Department and sharing of information. Convergence of livelihood development and social security based govt. schemes and programme of various department contributing to productivity enhancement of these areas.
- At the community level the primary strategy for FRA land development initiatives is to be provided for a sustainable means of livelihood through assets based agriculture and horticulture development for the tribal community.

Therefore, you are requested to prepare a development action plan in respect of OTELP areas with the involvement of the SMSs of ITDAs and FNGOs for the year 2016-17 and implement the intervention in right spirit for enhancing the productivity of FRA land.

GUIDELINES FOR EFFECTIVE IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CONVERGENCE PROGRAMS FOR FOREST RIGHTS HOLDERS UNDER FOREST RIGHTS ACT (FRA)

Background:

The Scheduled Tribes & Other Traditional Forest Dwellers (Recognition of Forest Rights) Act, 2006 has come into force with effect from January, 2008, which secures tenurial and access rights of tribal and other traditional forest dwellers over forest land. The Act provides a comprehensive and empowering framework for recognition of both individual and community forest rights of the scheduled tribes and other traditional forest dwellers, who primarily depend on forest for their livelihood.

The amended FRA Rule (Rule 16) provide for post-claim support to holders of forest rights which mandate the state government to ensure that all government schemes, including those relating to land development, land productivity, basic amenities and other livelihood measures are extended to the individuals and communities whose rights have been recognized under the Act through its various departments.

The ST & SC Development Department has been implementing the Act expeditiously in a mission mode. The department has stressed on convergence of livelihoods development and social security based government programs and schemes to ensure livelihoods and food security of the forest rights holders under FRA.

Strategy for Convergence:

- Awareness on convergence programs and schemes meant for forest rights holders under FRA.
- Gram Sabha based planning of convergence programs with the involvement of forest rights holders, CFR management committee members and women.
- Support mechanism at the district and sub-district level to support Gram-Sabhas in the planning and effective implementation of the convergence programs.
- Coordination between line departments and sharing of information. Convergence of livelihood development and social security based government schemes and programs of various departments contributing to productivity enhancement of these areas.
- State level coordination between the ST & SC Development department and other line departments such as Rural Development, Panchyati Raj, Agriculture etc. and with agencies working on FRA.
- At the community level the primary strategy for FRA land development initiatives is to provide a sustainable means of livelihood through assets based Agriculture & Horticulture development for the tribal communities.

Major Convergence Programs and Schemes for livelihoods enhancement:

Land Development: Lands vested under FRA can be converted into productive assets by undertaking a host of land development activities under MGNREGA which include land levelling, stone bunding, field bunding, contour bunding etc. depending upon the need and requirement of the title holders.

Creating irrigation potential: Irrigation is one of the major obstacles in the FRA lands for undertaking agriculture and horticulture activities. Water-shortages acts as a hindrance in agricultural farming thereby making the land economically unproductive. To address the irrigation issues in these land, dug wells or farm ponds are to be facilitated through convergence under MGNREGS or through Horticulture Deptt's schemes.

Agriculture & Horticulture development in FRA Lands: This component seeks to increase the productivity of FRA lands. Priority should be given to food crops, agrobiodiversity. INRM (integrated natural resource management) activity, agro-forestry as they maintain local ecology while ensuring livelihood, food and nutrition security of the tribal and other traditional forest dwellers. Improved crop varieties should be promoted only with due consultation with the forest rights holders and gram-sabha. The availability of good quality seeds and saplings shall be provided to the targeted forest rights holders through convergence with Agriculture & Horticulture Deptt. This initiative, in addition to increasing the income from fruits and vegetables will also provide nutrition to the tribal. With agroforestry, inter cropping and restoration of agro-biodiversity it is possible for the forest dwelling communities / farmers to strengthen local economy in a sustainable manner.

FRA rights holders shall be provided with horti-forestry orchard (WADI) on sloping FRA uplands with suitable varieties- typically local species (Amla, Neem, Harida, Bahara, Satavari, other fruit crops as a first choice) and Mango, Cashews as per the suitability of the climate & surroundings and preferences of the right holders.

Harvesting of Minor Forest Produces: MFPs provide a major source of livelihoods to the forest dwellers particularly women in tribal and forest areas. Programs can be taken up to promote MFP collectives (cooperatives/producers' groups/SHGs), to facilitate harvesting, processing, value addition and marketing of the MFPs. The ongoing MSP scheme for MFPs can be taken up under the convergence programs to provide assured income to the forest rights holders.

Forest protection and regeneration: The various forest protection and regeneration initiatives taken up by the forest rights holders can be promoted through the convergence programs to strengthen forest and wildlife conservation.

Implementation of Convergence Programs:

Gram Sabha based planning:

Gram Sabha based planning is the key to successful implementation of the convergence programs and need to be taken up on a priority basis. The planning process should be facilitated with the involvement of the forest rights holders, women, FRC members, CFR management committee members. In this process inputs may be taken from Resource Organizations/ NGOs and line departments. There are Successful examples of the gram-sabha based planning process supported by the district administration in Kandhamal and Mayurbhanj and those could be replicated...



District level planning:

)

• At the district level, there shall be a committee under the Chairmanship of the Collector, wherein the PD, DRDA, Deputy-Director, Agriculture / Horticulture, representatives of Soil conservation wing, PA, ITDAs/ DWOs concerned would be the members. This committee should meet quarterly and chalk out the detailed plan for effective implementation/execution of the Gram-sabha based plan/ convergence programme. Concerned Departmental authorities should utilize the services of their respective field staff posted at the Block./ Sub-division level.

Planning & Selection of forest rights holders:

- Inventory of FRA title holders under each ITDA shall be prepared and phase wise planning shall be made to cover all FRA land title holders under the productive enhancement programme over a period of 3 years starting from 2016-17 to 2018-19. All the line department shall therefore share the data with ITDAs. Copy of the Gramsabha resolutions, prepared social and resource map during Gramsabha planning along with their proposed plan must be available with ITDA through line departments for smooth tracking and record.
- In case of IFR title holders Plot wise planning shall be made by the field functionaries' i.e WEOs. Project Managers, Subject Matter Specialists & FNGOs in response to the Gram Sabha plans in consultation with the FRA title holders. Village where CFR rights is recognized CFR based convergence plan can also be proposed by Gramsabha
- Plot to plot visit and Focus Group Discussion (FGD) with the FRA title holders shall be made to identify possible interventions for each FRA land.
- Selection of forest rights holders for coverage under MGNREGS or any other convergence programs shall be done in the Gram-sabha (Palli Sabha under FRA). The list of selected FRA title holders shall be approved by the respective Gram Sabha. The projects shall be the part of annual shelf of the projects and shall be approved as per the MGNREGS guidelines.
- List of selected title holders for schemes /programme of the line Deptt. like Agriculture. Watershed (Water Resources), Horticulture Deptt shall be provided to the respective departments for needful coverage.

Nature of Assistance:

- Depending on the land holding size, the nature of interventions shall be identified, in consultation with the FRA title holders. Accordingly, standard design & estimate of the works shall be prepared in consultation with the line department.
- The estimate shall have clear delineation of financial assistance from different convergence sources as well as gap filling proposed from the ST & SC Development Department. Provision of voluntary contribution from the selected title holders shall be made to ensure ownership of the assets.
- A copy of the budget and plan shall be available with ITDA as well as with the Gramsabha

Implementation Mechanism:

- The Action Plan and Budget for development of FRA lands under convergence of various schemes should be approved in the District Level Committee (and the Project Level Committee of ITDAs/ MADAs).
- The funds required under SCA to TSP or Vanabandhu Kalyan Yojana, should be worked out and approved in the PLC of ITDAs and MADAs. The approved plan should be included in the Annual Plan for SCA to TSP for the respective ITDA/MADA/ Micro projects for PVTGs and should be submitted to ST&SC Development Department.
